Treasurer's Report

As of 30 Sept 2004, the current Chapter balance is \$17,983.50. Income for the calendar year so far is \$1,482.39 and was mostly based on membership dues. Expenses during the first 3 quarters of the calendar year totaled \$1,216.93. Major expense items were the Tracking Workshop deposit, Chapter Social activities, and a contribution to the TWS National Conference.

Scholarship and Conference Attendance Grant Update

The Chapter will initiate its scholarship and conference grant program this autumn. Wildlife students attending any of the 30+ colleges within the Chapter's geographic boundary will be eligible for the awards. Undergraduates from both junior colleges and four year schools will be considered, as well as graduate students.

Specifically, several \$500 academic scholarships will be available in 2004. The application due date will be **December 1, 2004** with an award date of **January 1, 2005**. Applicants will be asked to address two important questions:

- First, how the applicant is deserving of the scholarship, based upon criteria contained within the application.
- Second, how the awarding of the scholarship to the applicant would be considered an investment in the wildlife profession and The Wildlife Society.

Conference attendance grants of up to \$200 will also be available and can be submitted by the applicant at any time of the year, prior to a conference.

NATURAL RESOURCES COMMUNICATION WORKSHOP – January 3-7, 2005

The Natural Resources Communication Workshop, sponsored by the Western Section of The Wildlife Society, is designed to help natural resource workers more effectively communicate with general as well as technical audiences through personal presentations using good visual aids. The workshop focuses on the use of computer-generated images (i.e., PowerPoint images). The workshop is practical-oriented and enhances participants' communication skills in planning, preparing, presenting, and evaluating presentations. Since many of the problems in natural resources management are people-oriented, more effective communication can significantly improve many management programs.

Workshop Content:

1. Discussion topics include:
 - Planning: communication principles, audience analysis, graphic design
 - Preparing: creating computer-generated graphics, photographic composition, rehearsal tips
 - Presenting: equipment setup, speaking tips, dealing with difficult audiences
 - Evaluating: evaluation of performance
2. Each participant will bring a selection of computer-generated images (ex., graphics created with PowerPoint or other presentation software programs) for organization into an illustrated talk.
3. Each participant will prepare graphics (titles, graphs, charts, maps, cartoons, etc.) to be used in their presentations.

- Each participant will give a 5- and 15-minute presentation (which will include graphics prepared during the workshop). These presentations will be evaluated by the class and the instructors.

Instructors: Dr. Jon K. Hooper, Professor, Calif. State Univ., Chico (Certified Wildlife Biologist, Ph.D. in Wildlife Ecology, 30 years teaching communication workshops around the country) and Mr. Ethan Rotman, Calif. Dept. of Fish and Game (Coordinator, Fishing in the City in the San Francisco Bay Area, 20+ years professional experience as an environmental interpreter and communicator)

Location: California State University, Chico (90 miles north of Sacramento)

University Credit: Participants receive 1-unit CSUC Continuing Education credit; the workshop is worth 32 hours of continuing wildlife education credit through The Wildlife Society's Professional Development Program (Category II).

Application Procedure: The initial deadline for applications is **Friday, October 29, 2004**. Late applications are accepted (such applicants will become participants if the workshop is not yet full; otherwise, they will be placed on a waiting list in case of cancellations). The registration fee is \$645. The workshop will be limited to 16 participants. To apply, send a letter, fax, or email describing: (1) your current position within your agency or organization, (2) how you will use the training, and (3) any special reasons why you feel you should be chosen as a participant. America's Lion: A Workshop

*Note: This is not a TWS-sponsored workshop.

Join us for a workshop exploring the natural history of mountain lions, as well as the complex issues which will affect their continued survival in this new century.

Saturday, October 9, 2004, from 9:30-4:00 at the Multispecies Reserve in Riverside County, California, **Michelle Cullens** and **Christa Mann** of the Mountain Lion Foundation will detail the biology, behavior and natural history of the mountain lion, an animal so elusive that wildlife professionals still don't know how many exist within California. In addition, participants will be provided with statistical references, background and findings of mountain lion research, analysis of the causes of lion-human conflict, and an examination of possible solutions.

Group activities will help you to better understand mountain lion behavior, and to use this new understanding to address human concerns about wildlife. We will take a hike to learn about the signs of mountain lion presence. Finally, we will discuss the challenges facing conservationists in insuring that mountain lions will survive in sustainable populations throughout their historic range, for the benefit of future generations.

This workshop is designed for people who work in mountain lion country, who communicate regularly with people subject to wildlife contact, or who are in a position to educate others regarding mountain lions.

Dress comfortably. Bring a lunch and drink you can carry in your backpack on the short hike. Participants must be at least 15 years of age. **There is no charge for the event, but an RSVP is required.** Please RSVP to:
