Bufferlands Big Day Bird Tour

Saturday, April 23rd 7:00 am - 3:00 pm

Would you enjoy a fast-paced day in the field, searching diverse habitat types for a wide variety of bird species? If so, join members of the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District's (SRCSD) Bufferlands staff for a day in search of 100 species, or more (in the past three years, we've seen between 108 and 112 species). Expect to see a heron, egret and cormorant rookery, many species of waterfowl, shorebirds, raptors, migrating songbirds, and lingering winter residents. The SRCSD's Bufferlands contain 2,650 acres of seasonal and permanent wetlands, riparian forest, grasslands, vernal pools, and restored habitats. Group size is limited, so be sure to reserve a place in advance.

Walk on the Wildside

Join the Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District (SRCSD) Bufferlands and the Stone Lakes National Wildlife Refuge for a Walk on the Wildside, a celebration of International Migratory Bird Day. Walk on the Wildside highlights local efforts to protect and restore Central Valley habitats. This free. family-oriented event includes tours. presentations, live animals, music, hands-on activities, informational exhibits, and more. Guided and self-guided tours are offered throughout the day. Explore a pristine valley oak riparian forest in search of migratory songbirds. Visit numerous wetland and riparian restoration projects. Enjoy a unique opportunity to see one of approximately four heron rookeries in Sacramento County on a Bufferlands guided tour. This rookery contains over 100 active nests of great blue herons, great egrets, and double-crested cormorants. Spotting scopes will be available for optimum viewing of these fascinating birds.

We anticipate a general call for papers in late summer 2005 and encourage presentation of both completed original research projects and preliminary or interim study results. The deadline for submission of abstracts is Friday, October 14, 2005. Western Section Needs Your Papers!

The Western Section's annually published peerreviewed journal, "Transactions of the Western Section of The Wildlife Society," is seeking papers for consideration to publish in the 2005 volume. The "Transactions" publishes papers addressing wildlife management, research, conservation, and planning topics focusing on the Western United States as well as papers that address general wildlife topics of interest to the Western Section's 1200 members. The "Transactions" have a rapid publication turn around time of usually 7-8 months after the paper is submitted, and there are no page costs for Western Section members. Submissions are typically due by May 1 of each year, but submission deadlines are generally extended thru June or July. The 2005 "Transactions" are be published early 2006. Submissions from students are particularly encouraged, and submissions do not have to be papers presented at the Section's Annual Conference.

TRACKING WORKSHOP

Hurry and Register! There are still limited spots available at the Tracking Workshop on April 26-27, 2005 at The Nature Conservancy Cosumnes River Preserve in Sacramento California. Come learn about tracking and increase your awareness of the natural environment with Rick Berry of the Children of the Earth Foundation, associated with Tom Brown's Tracking School. Expect to observe tracks of birds, small mammals, deer and any other animals that use the Cosumnes River Preserve We will be meeting at the Cosumnes Preserve Visitor's Center. This 2-day basic tracking class will be held entirely in the field. Topics that will be covered include: Animal Tracking, ID, Gaits, Trails, Runs and Sign, Track Aging, Introduction to Pressure Release Studies, Awareness Exercises, Introduction to the Language of the Birds and Concentric Ring Studies.

ASPEN AND MEADOW RESTORATION WORKSHOP

The Chapter is pleased to announce that the Aspen and Meadow Restoration Workshop has been rescheduled for **Tuesday July 26, 2005**. (Due to inclement weather last fall, this workshop had been postponed.) Fire suppression, overgrazing and hydrological changes are factors that have led to the degradation of these important montane habitats. However, in recent years, public and private forest managers have been undertaking projects for restoring aspen and meadow habitats. The aim of this workshop will be to explore the logistical and policy issues associated with carrying out these sorts of projects on-the-ground. Wildlife biologists, foresters, agency staff and other

ECOLOGY AND MANAGEMENT OF FOREST HEADWATER STREAMS, SEEPS, SPRINGS, PONDS, and WETLAND HABITATS

Return of the Harpy

At least, that is the joint *goal* of the Belize Zoo and The Peregrine Fund. In a recent trip to Belize, I

had the opportunity to visit the Belize Zoo, and even take a night tour. The Belize Zoo is part of the Tropical Education Center, whose goal is to reintroduce the harpy eagle to Belize. This small Central American country, about the size of New Jersey, was once home to populations of this fantastic raptor. You'd have to see it in person to really appreciate its magnificent stature and truly

frightening talons imagine a hallux or hind claw the size of a grizzly bear's! The harpy eagle (Harpia harpyja) has a 7 foot wingspan and weighs between 10 and 18 pounds. preying mainly on sloths but may also take monkeys, iguanas, and other birds. The harpy is rare – there are only a few known populations



Guyana, Venezuela, and Panama. Decline of the harpy is mainly due to fragmentation and destruction of the lowland tropical forest that is its habitat, and depredation by humans.

The Peregrine Fund has long been working to harpy by preventing conserve the persecution through education, identifying and conserving important habitat on a broad scope, and developing species restoration techniques that were used to recover North America's beloved peregrine falcon. The Tropical Education Center conservation staff is thrilled to be working with The Peregrine Fund to conserve and reintroduce the harpy to Belize, especially given the success of the program in Panama, where the harpy is the national bird. In 2003, 4 harpy chicks were released in Belize, near the Guatemalan border, and one resides in the Belize Zoo for education. I met this bird in the zoo, and gazing upon its shadowy grey cloak of feathers I felt privileged to see such a beautiful creature, and I made a sincerely hopeful wish for the recovery its species.
