TWS Certification Workshop

There were approximately 115 of you listening to presentations and participating in the discussion with leading restoration and wildlife ecologists on how to design and restore wetland and riparian habitats for a diversity of California's sensitive wildlife species.

2008 TWS Sacramento-Shasta Chapter Scholarship Update

We are proud to report that the Sacramento-Shasta Chapter has awarded over \$2,000 in scholarships in 2008. A \$304 travel grant was awarded to eight Feather River College students so that they could attend the Western Section Annual meeting in Redding in February. This was the third year the Chapter has awarded a travel grant to students from that school.

Last year the Chapter didn't receive any applications for academic scholarships, so this year we ramped up our efforts to spread the word about their availability, and we're pleased to announce it paid off. We received five applications and awarded three scholarships totaling \$1,950 this year. We awarded \$200 to Linda Dieter, a Feather River College student finishing her A.S. in Administrative Office Management and an A.A. in Liberal Arts with the goal to become a virtual assistant with GIS skills with the objective of assisting Wildlife. awarded \$750 to Katie Moriarty, a graduate student in Oregon State University's Department of Fisheries and Wildlife, studying the effects of forest landscape changes on American martens. And, finally, we awarded \$1,000 to David Ngoseck Mollel, a sophomore at American River College majoring in Natural Resources, who intends to pursue a career in ecosystem management.

If you're interested in applying for a scholarship, there are now two deadlines for the year: **December 1**st and **June 1**st. The application can be downloaded from Student Info page on the Chapter's website.

Treasurer's Report

To date, the Chapter balance is \$18,286.00. Gross revenue totals \$968.20, not including the restoration workshop or the last mixer. Expenses to date are \$4,140.63. Major expenses include scholarships, community outreach, and preparation for workshops. Major revenue to date was generated from membership dues and account dividends.

Chapter Dues: A Balancing Act

Expenses continue to increase, and yet the Chapter's dues have remained at \$7 for about 10 years now. Over the past few years, the Chapter has increased its service to its membership which now warrants an updating of our dues. Beginning January 2009, the Chapter dues will increase to an even \$10. This slight increase is comparable with other chapters statewide. The revenue generated will help pay for the following services:

- Keeping workshops affordable. Often registration for classes and workshops can cost \$500-\$1,000 each. The Chapter offers workshops that provide great value for price. The Natural Resources Symposium, for example, is less than \$100!
- Offering more scholarships. Part of the Chapter's goal is to encourage students to study within those fields related to wildlife, and offering scholarships is one way to tangibly support those students. The Chapter offers scholarships for education, research, travel, and the TWS Certification fees.
- Maintaining the website. The website is an essential link to our membership. Our Chapter has a beautiful, elegant website that was designed and is maintained by a professional webmaster. In addition, new webhosting

- services may be needed as the Western Section changes its hosting services.
- Supporting local events. Earth Day, Creek Week, Nature Bowl... these are annual events you know and love, and the Chapter helps sponsor them!
- Offering mixers! We love bringing fellow wildlifers together, and we love bringing wildlifers and environmental professionals together. In fact, the more mingling the better, because sometimes a fresh way of thinking about things is the key to survival. Whether it's bringing your family to see bats in the Basin, or having beer and pizza with colleagues, the Chapter socials offer something for everyone.

We hope the new dues won't inconvenience you too much, but be comforted in the fact that your extra dollars will help the Chapter provide better service for everyone, including YOU.

Spliting hairs in the snow

Studying elusive creatures like the American marten (*Martes americana*) require creative techniques. For my graduate project in the Tahoe National Forest, surveys were conducted using a combination of track-plates (summer), digital remote sensor cameras, snowtracking,

and genetics. And like most graduate projects, financial assistance ran low. A portion of the project genetics component can be attributed to the Sac-Shasta Chapter and a generous grant.

Martens are associated with late-seral stages of coniferous forests that have structural complexity near the ground. Because of specialized habitat requirements, martens have been shown to be sensitive to forms of land management that reduce cover and forest continuity. Comparing historical and current distributions indicates a decline within their historic range in the northern Sierra and southern Cascades ranges, with most remnant populations clustered in unmanaged forests having late successional attributes.

My graduate research focuses on the distribution of martens within the Sagehen Creek Experimental Forest and to the northwest in the Webber Lake Basin (Tahoe National Forest). Here martens have been documented periodically, from 1979 – 1993. Because of the unique opportunity to work in a well studied area, our project hopes to provide current and thorough information on marten distribution for future projects. These results, combined with the prior studies, are an unprecedented time series of information that can be related to the history of landscape change in the study area.

I hope to analyze the data and present by the next Western Section Annual Conference. Much thanks to the Sacramento Shasta Chapter and the Western Section – TWS for their assistance.
