The Board met at the TWS-Western Section annual meeting at the Radisson Hotel in Sacramento on February 1. The meeting was standing-room only, and members from all over the Sacramento-Shasta region attended. The new board for 2012 was introduced as follows. The Board is voting to accept the 2012 budget. The Chapter contributed \$500 to the TWS-Western Section meeting this year, plus donated prizes for the student raffle, and voted on contributing \$100 to the Western Section to send Cynthia Perrine to Washington D.C. for the Teaming with Wildlife Fly-in event. This event, which TWS National participates in each year, is an advocacy and education event focused around securing nongame funding for state fish and wildlife agencies.

The Board is also discussing having members volunteer as docents at the Cosumnes River Preserve to help educate children and the public about local wildlife and ecosystems.

Chapter Representative to the Western Section Report

Most of the Board's business over the past three meetings has involved budgeting, planning, and discussing the results of the 2012 Annual Conference in Sacramento. We had one of the highest attendance counts this time at over 500 registrants. All preconference symposia also met or exceeded predicted attendance numbers, so the Section appears to have made a decent profit from the conference, including generating a lot of money for Student Affairs.

Student Affairs has a new Chairperson, David Wyatt, professor at Sacramento City College; and Conservation Affairs has a new Chairperson, Armand Gonzales. Once a mission statement and definition on the boundaries of creating and advocating policy without encountering conflicts of interest as a non-profit have been developed, the hope is that in time every Chapter will have either their own Conservation Affairs Committee or at least a representative that actively participates in the Western Section's committee.

Don Yasuda, Section Representative to National, is working on developing an Adopt-a-Student program at the Section level similar to National's. It would link professional TWS members with student members. National is trying to coordinate this program with their Mentor program since they apparently have more mentors than mentees at this time.

Professional Development is planning two bat workshops this year: Bat Ecology at Dye Creek Preserve near Los Molinos in April, and Bat Acoustics at Swanton Pacific in Santa Cruz in May.

The Board just recently voted to approve supporting the establishment of a new Student Chapter at Cal Poly.

Brown-bag Seminars

The Chapter is continuing its brown-bag seminars this year, on the second Tuesday of April, June, August, and October. These seminars are informational and interesting and they are free! The first is scheduled for April 10th and will be located at the U.S. Fish and Wildlife building at 2800 Cottage Way in Sacramento. Angela Calderaro will discuss the Valley Elderberry Longhorn Beetle life history, identification, and survey and mitigation protocols.



Nature Bowl Science and Conservation Competition

Semi-finals are underway for the Nature Bowl, an elementary school activity-based competition held each spring, which receives contributions from the Chapter. The Chapter donated \$500 this year. This popular program increases the science and conservation literacy of third- to sixth-grade students in the Sacramento Valley and Foothills. The Nature Bowl is open to students from any school, group or organized youth club in the area. Teams consist of three to seven children each. Semi-finals were held in March, and the last semi-final will be held at the Nimbus Hatchery in Rancho Cordova on April 10 and April 12. Several groups will advance to the final event that will be held May 21, 2012, at CSU Sacramento.

Coaches attended workshops to help prepare students for the competition. Members are welcome to attend the event and show support for the students, and are encouraged to volunteer next year as coaches.

Swainson's Hawk Workshop – Save the Dates! *Melinda Bradbury*



The Sacramento-Shasta Chapter is hosting a Swainson's hawk workshop, which will be taught by Mike Bradbury. Mike has been involved with Swainson's hawk protection, conservation, and research activities for 20 years. He is a member of the California Swainson's Hawk Technical Advisory Committee and lead author of the species' recommended survey methodology and risk assessment.

The training has two options, either a 1-day classroom session or the 1-day classroom session with 3 field days. The field training follows the recommended survey methodology found at

www.dfg.ca.gov/wildlife/nongame/docs/swain_proto.pdf. The training topics include: Information on identification, nest and breeding ecology, and presence/absence surveying; the hawk's legal status, protection requirements, and life history; population trends, types and effects of disturbance, and how to develop a risk analysis; information and the process for consulting with DFG, if needed; and language that has been developed for Swainson's hawk Incidental Take Permits in the past.

The tentative training schedule is as follows:

April 12 – Classroom session (8:30 AM – 4:00 PM) with practical application exercises;

April 13 – Pre-nesting survey (full day with lunch break); May 11 – Post egg-laying survey (full day with lunch break);

June 21 – Pre-fledging survey (full day with lunch break).

Sacramento Zoo Conservation Initiative

The Sacramento Zoo is starting a new conservation initiative. The Zoo would like to include at least one local conservation project each year, and is looking for projects that require relatively small amounts of funding in future years. The project, if selected, would be guaranteed at least \$5,000 and receive a portion of an additional \$15,000 based upon the percentage of votes it receives from the Zoo visitors. The project will be selected in the fall, voting will last the following year (January – December), and the money would be awarded in January of the following year. The Zoo is tapping into our membership to try to find worthwhile projects that would consider taking Zoo funding. TWS Annual Conference in Portland, Oregon



TWS-National's annual conference will

be held in Portland, Oregon, on October 13-17, 2012. The meeting will include workshops, symposia, panel discussions, breakfast roundtables, special poster sessions, contributed papers (oral presentations), and contributed posters. TWS invites submission of contributed papers and posters on topics of wildlife ecology, management, conservation, education, or policy. Presentations will not be published, so TWS encourages reports from the author's most recent scientific investigations and management experiences. Presentations will be audio recorded and made available to conference attendees at the conclusion of the conference.
