Executive Board Happenings

The Board's last meeting was held at Hoppy Brewing Company on June 6th. First on the agenda was beer and hot wings, then to the business. The Board discussed using PayPal to accept credit cards, to make it easier for members to pay dues, as well as to pay for events and merchandise. The Professional Development Committee discussed plans for the second half of 2013, including two back-to-school mixers in September, a lunch mixer during the Natural Resources Symposium in November, and a holiday mixer with the AEP. The Board also discussed providing more brown bag lectures, having a good turnout of 25 people at the one in May.

Most of the discussion, however, was on the upcoming burrowing owl workshop scheduled for August. The Board plans to have fun merchandise for sale at the workshop: burrowing owl t-shirts and pint glasses.

Our UC Davis representative gave a report on events their Chapter had been enjoying, including a trip to Solano Land Trust parcels in the Suisun Marsh to do some small mammal trapping. The UC Davis Chapter also filled us in on their new board members, including a historian to keep track of archives. The Sacramento Shasta Chapter is considering adding a historian position as well. If any of you are interested in this, or a different position, come to our next Board meeting.

For a technology update, the Board discussed linking our event calendar to the TWS-western section website to get additional exposure. Our last course of business was a discussion on a possible eagle workshop in early 2014, with participation from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). Potential topics include the USFWS Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act permit and renewable energy.

Chapter Representative to the Western Section Report

The Western Section's Executive Board held an all-day meeting on Sunday April 28th at the East Bay Regional Park District's Shoreline Center in Oakland. This is a summary of highlights from that meeting and subsequent email votes and discussions. A subcommittee has been formed to start planning the 2014 meeting in Reno, and they're currently discussing pre-conference symposia ideas. A bid to host the 2017 TWS National conference in California was submitted. Western Section partnered with the San Francisco Bay Chapter to hold a remote camera workshop July 11-14, and is partnering with Cal Poly San Luis Obispo on a 4-unit Vertebrate Field Biology course August 5-16. The Board voted to contribute \$1500

to TWS National's Leadership Institute and \$2500 to the Quiz Bowl and the TWS National Conference in Milwaukee. The student academic scholarship applications will be updated to reflect biannual deadlines for submission. An effort to re-establish the Section's journal is still underway with potentially a new name, Western Wildlife, and an online format. Armand Gonzales, Conservation Affairs Committee Chair, stepped down. His replacement is expected to be appointed soon. Lastly, you can now help support TWS National while shopping at Amazon. The Burrowing Owl Workshop has two components, a field practicum and a symposium. The Field Practicum class (8/26) is FULL! We are confirming payment and accepting names for the wait list.
